Transforming the learning landscape of the school library: from research to best practice

What are the core dynamics of constructivist learning? What are the implications of this approach to learning for school libraries, particularly in relation to instructional interventions, collections and services? In his keynote address, Ross will answer these questions and present current research being undertaken through the Center for International Scholarship in School Libraries (CISSL) at Rutgers University. He will also discuss how this research can inform quality teaching and learning through the school library, as well as the school library's contribution to student essential learnings.

Guided inquiry: implementing productive pedagogy through the school library

Set within the context of key learning areas, this workshop will explore constructivist approaches to rethinking information literacy from the perspective of guided inquiry, and provide principles for designing and guiding meaningful inquiry through the school library. It will present a range of instructional strategies for developing meaningful teaching and learning activities through the school library, including engaging with Web 2.0 tools to facilitate deep inquiry, and will provide exemplars of instructional best practice to facilitate quality teaching and learning through school libraries.

Dr. Ross J. Todd is currently Research Director at the Center for International Scholarship in School Librarianship (CISSL) and Associate Professor in the School of Communication, Information and Library Studies at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey.

He is well known to teacher-librarians for his work at the University of Technology Sydney, for the many professional development activities he has presented for IASL, ASLA, SLAV and ALIA, and for editing the research component of Scan, the NSW Department of Education and Training journal.

Ross brings extensive international experience to this seminar. His primary teaching and research interests focus on adolescent information seeking and use. The research is multi-faceted, and includes:

- Cognitive information utilization and knowledge construction
- How school libraries and teacher-librarians more effectively empower student learning
- Information and critical literacies with emphasis on digital environments
- Building schools as effective information sharing communities.

He has published more than 100 papers and book chapters and has been an invited speaker at many international conferences. He is a member of the editorial board of the International Association of School Librarianship journal School Libraries Worldwide, the School Library Association Victoria journal, Synergy and the US publication School Library Media Research.

His awards include:

- Distinguished Service in Support of Teaching.

- Apple Teaching Fellow (1995)
